Animal Therapy at Huron House

We are excited to share our incredible progress this year in our animal therapy programs. As part of our commitment to providing holistic and innovative support for the youth in our community, we introduced two new programs: chicken therapy and dog therapy.

Through our dog therapy program, we have partnered with Jack, a certified therapy dog, who visits our center twice weekly. Jack's gentle and friendly nature has brought immense joy and comfort to our young participants. The interactions with Jack have proven to be a valuable source of emotional support, helping the youth build trust, reduce anxiety, and enhance their overall well-being.

Our chicken therapy program has also provided our participants with a unique and enriching experience. Interacting with chickens allows the youth to develop a sense of responsibility, empathy, and



compassion. Caring for the chickens, feeding them, and observing their behaviour fosters a deeper connection with nature and instills a sense of pride in the youth.

We have witnessed the positive impact of these animal therapy programs firsthand. The youth have demonstrated increased self-confidence, improved emotional regulation, and enhanced social skills. The presence of Jack and the chickens has created a nurturing and calming environment where our young participants feel safe to express themselves and form meaningful connections.

Hank (name is changed for privacy) a young 12 year old boy, living with his grandparents came to us with high behaviour episodes, to the point of causing harm to himself and others. He loved the property and the opportunities that HH offered and he bought into the program. Despite at times being the

youngest boy he was able to hold his own. Evenings he would often be found asleep on the living room couch with his blanket and stuffed animals.

Hank worked his way through the program starting with the basic program and worked his way to the Independent Living Program on our second floor. He has worked hard on himself through counselling, therapeutic and life skills groups, peer relations and anger management just to name a few.

Over the past 5 years we have had the privilege to witness and assist this troubled young boy grow into a young man of honour and opportunities.

One of our 'babies' is ready to leave the nest and we couldn't be more proud of the young man he has become. We will miss him dearly but know that this relationship is not over, it has just matured.
